in WASHINGTON, D.C.

The ACHP Alumni Foundation is supporting a great opportunity for a student to gain educational and work experience at the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, the federal agency that advises the President and Congress on historic preservation.

If you have an interest in cultural preservation, historic preservation, learning about laws affecting tribes, working with Native Youth, or helping with outreach and goals that could help preserve Sacred Sites, **spend 2 to 3 months at the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation in Washington, D.C., and receive credit towards your degree, plus a stipend.**

Here are the details:

Position: Native Scholar

Type: Internship Opportunity

Location: Washington, DC

Details: The successful applicant will work for minimum 8 week to maximum 12-week period anytime over the next academic year and can begin any time after August 1, 2017. A \$500/ week stipend from the ACHP Alumni Foundation helps defray living expenses. Assistance finding housing and travel expenses not to exceed \$1,000 are available.

Deadline to Apply: July 1, 2017!

If you are interested in historic preservation, anthropology, archaeology, history, public history, public policy, American Indian/Native American or Indigenous studies, law, museum studies, cultural resource management or similar disciplines, apply today for this internship/fellowship.

This semester-long Native Scholar internship is open to advanced undergraduate students, recent undergraduates, and current or recent graduate students (including those entering a graduate program in 2017/2018).

The selected scholar will work in the Office of Native American Affairs at the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation and have opportunities to be involved in tribal and/or Native Hawaiian historic preservation issues. Projects may include working on Traditional Cultural Landscapes, Improving Tribal Consultation and Developing Resources for Native American Youth, among other topics.

Projects will be based on the skills and interests of the scholar and agency needs, and can be adapted to academic research projects. The scholar will also participate in meetings and programs with other ACHP offices and federal agencies.
